In July, German football league top tier Bundesliga team, Turnund Sportgemeinschaft (TSG) 1899 Hoffenheim, donated 122 football jerseys to the Lighthouse Tiwale adolescent's service. These jerseys were donated to be used for intentional behavior empowerment support sporting activities which makes a part of the adolescent annual activity plan.

The Lighthouse-Hoffenheim relationship is due to the partnership between Lighthouse and Universities of Heidelberg and Cologne in Germany. Hoffenheim had previously donated footballs to several youth organizations in Malawi and Lighthouse was one of the beneficiaries of this donation through Dr. Colin Speight, Lighthouse Clinical Advisor from 2013 to 2015. After this donation, pictures were sent to Dr. Florian, a former Lighthouse Clinical Advisor, Faculty member of University of Heidelberg and leader of the

Friends of Lighthouse— Germany who then delivered these photographs to Hoffenheim club. Outstandingly, Lighthouse was the only Malawian organization that had acknowledged receipt of the donation, which impressed Hoffenheim and led to this donation of 122 football Jerseys.

2nd Annual MAC Conference Exposes Sleeping Giant

Close to 100 Lighthouse HIV Testing Counsellors and HIV Diagnostic Assistants (HDAs) joined counsellors from various disciplines within Malawi for the second National Conference for the Malawi Association of Counsellors (MAC) that took place on the 9th of August 2016 at Pacific Hotel in Lilongwe.

The conference which was themed "Counseling for Healing, Growth and Wellbeing", addressed mental and psychosocial problems taking place within Malawi, the gaps within counselling practices, the challenges facing the growth of the service in Malawi, and highlighted the need for support systems for those working in the profession.

Presiding over this gathering was Prof. Sam Phiri, Executive Director of Lighthouse Trust, who in his speech said professionally trained psychosocial counsellors, the psychotherapists, are needed in mitigating the impact of psychosocial challenges the people of Malawi are currently facing. Expounding that there was a growing awareness that over 20% of primary health care users suffer from physical illnesses triggered or caused by psychosocial emotional problems. And that under the current clinical setup, medical attention is mostly tailored to tackle the physical illness, leaving the mental and psychosocial problems, the causative agents, unresolved and unattended. In his speech he also reminded MAC, whose role is making sure the people of Malawi have access to proper adequate counselling services, of its responsibility in overseeing the professional quality of counselling training and services, governed by ethical standards including confidentiality. Concluding by commending the work of the association and presence of the participants.

Presentations on the program included the Key Note Address by Dr. Beatrice Mwagomba, Program Manager for Non-communicable Diseases at the Ministry of Health, an update regarding the annual activities of the association by Mr. Dominic Nsona, MAC interim Chairperson and Lighthouse HIV Testing Counselling Services Coordinator, and a thought provoking presentation on the critical review of counselling practice in Malawi by Mr. Essau Chinkwezule, the Dean of Guidance and Counselling at the Africa University of Guidance, Counselling and Youth Development. In her presentation, Dr. Beatrice Mwagomba gave a brief background of the different types of counselling, outlining the work involved in individual, couples, family, and group counselling, services which are available across Malawi. She went on to explain that the basic principles of counselling applied to various scope of problems and that specific counselling programs such as the Comprehensive HIV Testing and Counselling trainings had the foundation of key counselling principles.

Dr. Mwagomba also expressed the need for talking therapy for people with chronic health conditions such as hypertension and diabetes, explaining that they were more vulnerable to depression. Anger Management, divorce, and substance abuse were also highlighted during her presentation as cases that needed attention in Malawi.

While much of the discussion centered on the western understanding of counselling, Mr. Essau Chinkwezule, whose presentation was titled The Sleeping Giant: Critical Review of Counselling Practice in Malawi, married the western and cultural under-

Coordinator, received the donation on behalf of the Lighthouse on their visit to Germany during their short course on Quality Management in International Health at the University of Heidelberg. The team took time to visit the Hoffenheim Training Camp with Dr. Neuhann and tour the premises.

The Nutritional Adolescent Support Officer (NASO), Robert Qaba, said the donation was timely, looking at the number of adolescents that are accessing care and support at the Lighthouse, it is going to help to reinforce positive psycho social behaviors amongst adolescents. The program, which started with 25 adolescents in 2008, currently has 497 adolescents receiving ART care and treatment at Martin Preuss Center, another Lighthouse Trust center at Lilongwe's Bwaila Hospital. The program itself has a number of activities, ranging from intentional programming and child centeredness camps, advanced leadership for older adolescents, routine Antiretroviral Therapy (ART) and psychosocial clinics, parental and guardian trainexchange education trips, Care of ing, Carers for service providers, and the annual Memory Tree Graduation ceremony.

standing of counseling to analyze the meaning of mental health in the Malawian traditional setting. Outlining the reasons why counselling practice was not fully utilized by the people of Malawi and explaining that part of the problem was that

the service itself was not properly provided and readily available in the facilities.

To top it all, although much of the day entailed discussing the "unrealized potential" of counselling in Malawi, it was evident from the turn out of the participants for the conference that many within the profession understand their role in strengthening selfesteem, improving coping skills and promoting behavioral change and optimal mental health for the communities of Malawi
